Ancillary Options to Help Combat Malicious Burning

As committed by city administration after the events of St. Patrick's Day weekend, staff is currently researching and reviewing all available options that may be legally exercised to address and respond to criminal activities associated with malicious burning. As referenced in the attached memorandum from Fire Chief Mark Caravasos, enforcement strategies to this effect include expanding public safety coverage in existing No Fire Zone areas of Morgantown, specifically downtown, fraternity hill, and other areas of the community that have experienced statically high levels of malicious burning. The Morgantown Police Department will therefore collaborate with the Morgantown Fire Department, the West Virginia University Police Department, and other stakeholders including landlords and property owners to maximize applicable enforcement in all such areas of the City. Meanwhile, city administration will continue to further research and evaluate additional potential strategies to effectively resolve this ongoing issue.

Morgantown Bicycle Improvement Program

As a follow-up to the March 27th Committee of the Whole meeting presentation regarding a proposed Morgantown bicycle improvement plan, city administration was able to review relevant details, including which projects and programs that can be implemented during the new fiscal year. These include working with the West Virginia Division of Highways to install a bicycle climbing lane on

Monongahela Boulevard between Eighth Street and Evansdale Drive; develop a bicycle route map for the City of Morgantown; and to encourage the Monongalia County School District to establish a safe route(s) to school curriculum. As far as the recommendation to adopt the plan, arrangements are being made for your review and consideration during your May 1st regular meeting. As referenced the attached electronic mail message from Morgantown Monongalia Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) Executive Director Bill Austin, this exercise also involves inclusion into the MPO's Long Range Transportation Plan – enabling support for countywide expansion respectively.

Possibility of Future Seneca Park Project

Deputy City Manager Jeff Mikorski and I were invited to meet with leadership of Sunnyside Up earlier this week to discuss the possibility of developing a future pocket park located on a City of Morgantown residentially zoned parcel located adjacent to an alley near Grant Avenue between Sixth Street and Seventh Street. As referenced in the attached electronic mail message from Executive Director Jim Hunt, this proposal involves leasing the property for improvements noted, to include a community garden, short walking trail, and a rustic seating area. As over 50 volunteers are anticipated to contribute sweat-equity to help implement this project in the coming months, a presentation to this effect, outlining additional details for consideration, will be offered during your June 26th Committee of the Whole meeting. Meanwhile, staff from both the Department of Public Works and Engineering and the Morgantown Utility Board are being asked to review any questions and/or concerns relative to existing on-site infrastructure.

Prospect of Special Events and Venues Coordination

In response to a goal communicated during this year's proposed budget process to consider creative approaches to organize, expand, and coordinate special events and venues in our community, city administration is currently researching ways in which proposals for outside assistance to this effect can be achieved. As it is clear that the City of Morgantown enjoys a number of performance and recreational locations that are underutilized annually, this effort involves creating a way that our local venues can be more actively utilized to improve the quality of life, as well as marketing and promoting additional regional and national activities to take place in Morgantown. Considerations as to how the City of Morgantown,

and partners Main Street Morgantown, BOPARC, and the Greater Morgantown Convention and Visitors Bureau, can secure related opportunities, are to therefore be presented for your review and input in the coming weeks.

At the March 20th, 2012 council meeting, I was able to present to council a list of recommendations in dealing with the malicious fires that continually occur in the City of Morgantown. I wish to provide you an update as to where we are and what steps are being taken to deal with the problem.

Recommendations were put forth during several meetings that were held following the St. Patrick's Day incidents. These recommendations included stiffer fines, jail time, increased coverage of trouble areas and improved reporting of penalties from WVU.

Unfortunately, following conversations with the City's legal counsel, many of these recommendations are not available to use as options. Increasing the fine for the charge of malicious burning could be determined to be unreasonable, as the maximum fine for most other misdemeanor violations in the State of West Virginia is set at \$500.00. (WV State Fire Code allows for increased penalties; previously, the maximum monetary penalty for a fire code violation was \$1000.00. This has recently been increased to \$2000.00 with the passage of Senate Bill 597 which amends the section §29-3-16a of the Fire Prevention and Control Act).

The inclusion of jail time to the offense of malicious burning is also not recommended by the City's legal division. Reasoning for this decision is based on monetary concerns. By adding jail time to the offense, any person arrested for this offense could request a jury trial. In the event the city would lose a case, the city would have to pay for the cost of a jury and possibly any legal fees the accused would have accrued.

We are looking at the idea of expanding the existing "No Fire Zones" that exist in the City. Plans are already in place to increase surveillance and patrols in the areas where malicious fires routinely occur. Additionally, we are contemplating revival of City Fire Permits, where all fires within the city would require a permit prior to any burning taking place.

As additional ideas develop and actions to help curb these activities are identified, they will be forwarded to you for dissemination to other stakeholders.

Terrence,

Thank you for meeting with me yesterday to discuss the potential plans for the proposed Seneca Park Project. I have attached the map that we referenced on our site visit.

Sunnyside Up would propose to enter into a lease agreement for a nominal sum with the City of Morgantown for the parcel currently owned by the City of Morgantown. Sunnyside Up would develop a "passive type" park project which would include a community garden, walking areas and some rustic seating areas. We would clean and maintain the lot with minimal disturbance to the existing terrain. We would request a five year lease with options to renew for additional five year periods. We recognize that at some point in the future there might be some other use for this property and would be willing to agree to cancel the lease if that occurs.

As requested by the City Engineer, we will have the property surveyed to insure that we are operating on the proper boundaries.

We will work with the Morgantown Utility Board to address any concerns surrounding the existing storm drain and follow any recommendations from them.

We currently have a group that is willing to develop a community garden project on the property and they have identified over 50 volunteers that would be interested in working on the project. Sunnyside Up is working with this group to purchase seeds and supplies to assist with this effort. The produce that would be grown in the garden will be available to the residents of the Sunnyside neighborhood, the local homeless shelter and sold at the Morgantown Farmer's Market to sustain the garden.

I met today with a representative of the Botanical Garden group and discussed a possible collaboration.

This project has the potential to develop needed green space in the Sunnyside neighborhood and provide a productive purpose for residents of the neighborhood to engage in. It also follows the 2002 Sunnyside Comprehensive Revitalization Plan by developing the "Seneca Park" project that was described in the plan. It will also eliminate much of the negative activity that is currently occurring on this property. The litter and abandoned furniture is evidence of drinking and other activity that is not healthy for the neighborhood.

We would be happy to provide any other information that you would need. Thank you once again for you and your staff's attention to this worthy project.
